Wheatley Hill Primary Vision for the PE and Sport Premium

"All pupils leaving primary school will be physically literate and hold the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport."

The funding has been provided to ensure impact against the following objective:

To achieve <u>self-sustaining improvement</u> in the quality of PE and sport in primary schools. It is important to emphasise that the focus of spending must lead to long lasting impact against the school vision (above), that will live on, well beyond the Primary PE and Sport Premium funding.

What is Sport Premium?

The Primary PE and Sport Premium is government funding allocated to schools annually, since 2013/14. From 2-13/14, the funding amount schools received was based upon a lump sum of £8,000 followed by £5 per pupil, based on the number of primary age children the school has. From 2017, the Sports Premium has doubled to £16,000, followed by £10 per pupil. The PE and Sport Premium is designed to help primary schools improve the quality of PE, by increasing the quality and breadth of provision and increasing participation in PE and sport.

At Wheatley Hill Primary School we strive to promote healthy and active lifestyles and aim to provide sporting opportunities, for all our pupils.

Objectives of spending the Sport Premium:

The premium must be spent by schools on making additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of all pupils to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles.

The five key indicators that have been set are:

- The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school
- The profile of PESSPA being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
- Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- Increased participation in competitive sport

In <u>2022 – 2023</u>, Wheatley Hill Primary School will receive **£18,750** Primary PE & School Sport Premium. This will be used in conjunction with other grants and funds from the school budget to raise standards in curriculum **Physical Education**, **School Sport**, **Physical Activity** and Healthy living (PESSPA).
